### Introduction

If the service is new to you, we hope that in the combination of words, music and silence you will find within it a space for prayerful reflection in the midst of our busy and often hectic world.

# The Bishop of Lincoln writes:

'The readings have been chosen to reflect the fact that today is the Solemnity of Christ the King, the Sunday next before Advent.

The first lesson will be read by our daughter (Rebecca) who read the lesson at my consecration in Westminster Abbey on 21 September 2011. The second lesson will be read by Susan who read the lesson at my enthronement in November 2011 and who has supported me throughout my time in Lincoln, visiting many of the parishes with me on Sundays. I am deeply grateful to my family and friends for their love and support. Some are with us today — others cannot be. These include our family in Australia (James and Katie and our grandchildren, Joseph and Rosie) who will watch online. Our newest grandchildren (Dulcie and Emmeline) just 12 weeks old, are safely tucked up at the Bishop's House as they have yet to complete their vaccinations.

The music has been selected to reflect something of my time in ministry in Southwark, Portsmouth, London and Lincoln dioceses and the history of the Church in Lincolnshire. I have deliberately chosen well-known hymns – I hope you will all join in enthusiastically.'
