
Lincoln Cathedral

Welcome to Lincoln Cathedral

We are delighted to welcome you to this Epiphany Carol Service.

The season of Epiphany follows Advent and Christmas and begins the second half of Christmastide.

In the Christian churches of the East, Epiphany is the major festival at this time of year, eclipsing Christmas. This is because Epiphany (meaning 'revelation', or 'manifestation') celebrates the occasion on which Jesus was recognised by the magi. The magi had 'travelled from afar', and are representative of us and of all people everywhere recognising the universal nature of God's love and coming to worship Jesus, the manifestation of that love.

As such, Epiphany resonates with our recognition of Jesus as our Saviour, and this season gives us an opportunity to reflect on what it means to us for the Son of God to have revealed himself as Jesus of Nazareth.

During the season of Epiphany, we remember again the visit of the magi from the east, Christ's baptism in the Jordan, and the turning of the water into wine at the wedding feast in Cana. These are all revelations of God's glory in Christ and his identification with his people in every time and place.

Order of Service

From the south transept the choir sings The Three Kings by Peter Corelius

Solo:

Three Kings from Persian lands afar to Jordan follow the pointing star: and this the quest of the travellers three, where the new-born King of the Jews may be. Full royal gifts they bear for the King; Gold, incense, myrrh are their offering.

The star shines out with a steadfast ray; the kings to Bethlehem make their way, and there in worship they bend the knee, as Mary's child in her lap they see; their royal gifts they show to the King; gold, incense, myrrh are their offering.

Thou child of man, lo, to Bethlehem the Kings are travelling, travel with them! The star of mercy, the star of grace, shall lead thy heart to its resting place. Gold, incense, myrrh thou canst not bring; offer thy heart to the infant King.
