Welcome to Lincoln Cathedral

We are delighted to have you worship with us this afternoon and extend a very warm welcome to you.

This afternoon's service celebrates the very generous support given to our cathedral choir by individuals and groups from across Greater Lincolnshire and beyond. Today we say 'thank you' for that generosity, and we join together in worship to thank God for the gift of music: for those who compose and conduct it, who play and perform it. May the glory of God be heard in it, and our hearts rejoice in it.

Much of this afternoon's service is sung by the choir and follows a set pattern which is offered daily in the cathedral. Its essence is praise: words, inspired by God, used to worship him and lift our minds and hearts. The singing of psalms and the reading from the Old Testament unite us with our spiritual ancestors, the Jews, and with Jesus Christ, who himself used them to praise God. Our meditation on the word of God leads us to Jesus who is the Word made flesh, and so the *Magnificat* - a song of praise first sung by Mary, the mother of Jesus acts as a pivot, pointing us to the new relationship with God which is brought about in the birth of Christ. The remainder of the service celebrates that 'new covenant' and, in the intercessions, commits us to the life of service to which Christians are called.

We hope that in the combination of words, music and silence you will find a space for prayerful reflection in the midst of our busy and often hectic world.

ENDOWMENT OF THE CHAMBERS FAMILY CHORISTERSHIP

The chorister to receive the newly endowed choristership (Ethan Essilfie), and Ann Wells and Joy Chambers, representing the donors, stand with the Master of Choristers and Precentor in front of the dean.

The details of the endowment are read out, and the choristership is endowed with the following words

- Dean Giving thanks for the generosity of Michael and Dorothy Chambers, in recognition of which a choristership has been named, we dedicate this to the glory of God and the singing of His praises in this, His house of prayer; in the name of the same God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost
- All Amen.

Ann Wells and Joy Chambers present a medal inscribed with the name of the choristership to the chorister, who presents the donor's representatives with a document recording detail of the choristership.

The donor's representatives, chorister, Master of the Choristers, Precentor and Dean move to their places and the office of Evensong begins.
