**BIBLE READINGS** 

'A light for all people'

As we travel through the season of Epiphany the theme of light remains prominent in our worship. The Magi follow the light of the star to guide them to the Christ-child (as we celebrated on 6th January), and Simeon proclaims that Christ is the light to lighten all peoples when Christ is presented in the Temple (which we celebrate on 2nd February). As the days begin to gradually lengthen, the mornings become a little less dark and the evenings a little brighter – given a sign of the spring that, though still far off, will nonetheless come.

Whilst our focus is still firmly anchored in remembering the birth of Christ and the light of salvation that dawns through the incarnation, we begin to edge our thoughts toward passion of Christ and the coming light of Easter. This will become an explicit theme at Candlemas, when the introduction to the service reminds us that:

we celebrate both the joy of his coming and his searching judgement, looking back to the day of his birth and forward to the coming days of his passion.

So what does this mean for us? In a world where darkness can sometimes seem to overwhelm us, there is much that we can draw from this season of dawning light. It sets before us a story of hope, a hope that is made known in the signs and symbols of Christ's life. It is this hope that we need to set before us – aware that we cannot transform the world (or ourselves) solely by our own efforts. This requires a surrender – a surrender both to the light and joy of Christmas, but also to the pain and suffering of Christ's passion. Having come to see the light of Christ at Christmas, through the darkness of Christ's passion we will find that light shine even more brightly through the glory of Easter

So let us rejoice in the light that we have seen unveiled at Christmas and, aware of the cost of the Cross, let us set our sights on the transforming glory of Easter; that our lives may be transformed by the gift of knowing the eternal life that comes through Christ and, transformed by this light, we may shine as lights in our world.

Lord, you fulfilled the hope of Simeon and Anna, who lived to welcome the Messiah: may we, who have received these gifts beyond words, prepare to meet Christ Jesus when he comes to bring us to eternal life; for he is alive and reigns, now and for ever.
