The Chapter Letter

With Simon's return to Oxford, I became Interim Dean on 26 December. This is in addition to my existing responsibilities as Precentor, and will result in a little bit of shuffling of responsibilities within the clergy team of the cathedral:

Alan Moses, Succentor

We are fortunate that Alan Moses is able to temporarily support the cathedral on a part-time basis as Succentor. He will already be familiar to many who attend our weekday services (especially Morning Prayer and the lunchtime Eucharist) having recently covered the duties of Bishop's Liturgical Chaplain. Whilst I continue to have executive responsibility for liturgical matters at the cathedral, in this role Alan will take on much of the operational responsibility for the delivery of services - including the preparation of orders of service, the publication of service schedules and the actual delivery of services. In addition to Sunday services, Alan will normally be present on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. Alan will be working closely with Aric and Jeff and share in the line management of the vergers team. Alan will also attend the Senior Leadership Team and Chapter meetings so that liturgical matters are fully represented whilst I am undertaking the role of Interim Dean.

Peter Neil, Interim Residentiary Canon

In governance terms, the cathedral should have two full-time residentiary canons, and Peter has joined David Dadswell and myself from 26 December until Rowena King is installed as Missioner on 10 March so that there is sufficient cover for this role. Again, Peter is well-known to many in the cathedral as a non-residentiary canon and regular member of the congregation and others will know him from his role as Vice Chancellor of BGU - from which he retired last summer. During the period during which Peter is a residentiary canon, as well as fulfilling the responsibilities of canon in residence, Peter will be covering the line management of the education team before handing that over to Rowena when she joins us in March. Peter will also be attending SLT and Chapter meetings to represent those involved in our educational work and outreach to the community.

Safeguarding support

Separately, Claire Hunter is leaving her role as Cathedral Safeguarding Officer in January. We are in the process of recruiting a replacement for her, but there will be a period during which we have no dedicated CSO. This role combines operational responsibilities (largely to do with raising awareness and supporting good practice by those involved in working with children and vulnerable adults) with other duties that are delegated from the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor (largely concerning work that requires a qualified safeguarding professional). To manage safeguarding provisions during this temporary period the following arrangements are in place: To provide some continuity, as Interim Dean I will continue to have overall responsibility for safeguarding matters on a day-to-day basis. In this, I am grateful for the following people who are willing to be points of contact within their relevant areas:

- Sally Bleasdale (Education)
- Ann Mazur (Duty Chaplains and Pastoral Care)
- Tamsyn Taylor (Music)

For matters that require the support or advice of a safeguarding professional, we will be supported by Jack Redyoff (Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor) and members of his team. Stuart Welch has agreed to be the member of Chapter who will exercise oversight of safeguarding matters independently of myself. Stuart will be known to many as a regular member of the Sunday morning congregation and as one of our volunteer Head Guides. He has access both to Chapter and to the DSA if that is required (this is especially important if there is a matter where people have a concern relating to myself).
