BIBLE READINGS

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

Today we hear that acclamation of hope and joy, proclaimed on Easter morning in churches all over the world. The waiting is over; we celebrate again being a resurrection people, after our journey through Lent and Holy Week.

What I love about the post-Easter stories in the Gospel, however, is that they are a very real mix of human emotion: yes, there is joy and new hope, but this often sits alongside or is found only after grief, disbelief, fear, doubt and confusion. Somehow I find that reassuring. It seems to reflect the reality of our journey of faith more than any stories of straightforward recognition and happiness could. For most of us, learning to recognise the risen Christ in the context of our own lives is a life-long process - learning what death and resurrection feel like in our own experience and learning the difference between those things that really do give us a fullness of life and which are just empty promises and false hopes.

This experience of hope intermingled with doubt is one every believer has, as we wrestle with the reality of God's promise through Christ: the promise of new life in death - the promise of a God present as the seed of hope in the darkest corners of our lives and world.

"Really? Even here?" our doubts ask. "Yes. Especially here", the God of resurrection answers.

I think it is this process of asking questions, wrestling with our challenges, and seeking God in all our experiences that keeps us alive in our faith. One way of doing this is to explore the Ignatian practice of examen, or as one Jesuit writer calls it, "Rummaging for God". Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Jesuits, lived from 1491 to 1556, and during his life developed a series of spiritual tools designed to help people connect with the presence of God in the activities of their daily lives. One of these was the examen, which is a process of guided reflection on a day or week in order to look for signs of God's work. It is a tool that can help us to stop and focus, even for a short time, on where and how God might be speaking to us in the events of our days.

Whether you use a formal tool such as the examen, or whether you reflect in a less structured way, taking the time to slow down and look for the hints and seeds of God in our lives can help us to listen for the still, small voice that might be calling us into new paths and new life. It can help us to spend time in gratitude and thanksgiving for the life we receive in faith, and to join in with the work of God already happening in our lives.

Springtime provides us tangible symbols of new life: in the budding branches, daffodils and birdsong of (hopefully) sunny days, and these can provide us with daily reminders to attend to the signs of new life in our own lives. I hope that each of you might find the time this Eastertide to stop and give thanks for those signs of growth and life, no matter how small, trusting that as Christ rose from the grave, that we too are promised new life in all its fullness.
