BIBLE READINGS

By the time of our next Chapter letter, Britain will have voted and be in the process of discovering the shape of our newly constituted government, so it feels important to take a moment to reflect on the place of faith in politics (or politics in faith), and how we as a Christian community engage in the public life of our society.

"Religion and politics shouldn't mix" is a familiar trope, and yet when we

look to the life of Jesus, we see him consistently standing up to unjust power and speaking out for the poor and dispossessed, so much so that he died a political death.

As Christians, like Jesus, we care about people and their well-being, we care about building flourishing communities, and we care about building a just and equitable society - and these are political acts. Politics, at its heart, is about reshaping our nation towards a sense of the common good: as Christians our sense of the common good is centred in Christ.

Just because faith is necessarily political, it doesn't mean that faith is party political. There are many ways to build a flourishing society, and there are never black-and-white answers to complex communal and global problems. As Christians therefore, in exercising our democratic responsibilities, we are called into a time of listening and discernment as we seek to respond to our society's current issues and how we might best move forward to address them. We are not called to all agree on the answers, but we are, I believe, all called to participate and to engage.

There are many ways to listen and to pray through this election season. You may like to attend the hustings the Cathedral will be hosting (see events section), which we hope will be a place for respectful conversation about key issues, or you may like to join in the final two weeks of the Church of England's Pray Your Part initiative, which is an invitation from the Bishops of the Church of England to encourage prayer and participation in the life of our nation and communities. Each day explores a different theme, with a short Bible reading, reflection and prayer for a different aspect of our common life.

Archbishop Stephen said: "The General Election offers an important opportunity for each of us to play our part in helping shape our nation. To have our say on the issues that matter to us. To speak up about the things that we and our neighbours are facing. Every voice and vote matters in this election"
