BIBLE READINGS

Dear Friends,

On Monday evening the Cathedral hosted hustings for the Lincoln constituency. As I write this, the results of the General Election are coming in and by the time you read this, we will know who has been chosen to represent us in Parliament and who will form our next government.

Canon Brown knows that I write a weekly reflection on readings for the coming Sunday, so when he asked me after Evensong on Election Day if I could take over writing this issue of the Chapter Letter, I agreed readily. I know, as do many of you, how many responsibilities he carries as our Interim Dean. At the same time, I suspected that anything I wrote might well be drowned by the tsunami of post-election political commentary. I am not going to add to that flood, other than to say that whatever our political persuasion, as Christians we must pray for those who have been elected to serve in parliament and government. Theirs is an awesome responsibility, especially at a time when confidence in our politicians is at a low ebb

'Election' is a theological word as well as a political one. It refers to God's choice of people. Last weekend the Cathedral hosted the ordination of new priests and deacons. They are people who, having sensed that God was calling them to serve the Church, had that vocation confirmed by the Church.

They sprang to mind when I looked at Sunday's readings. My immediate thought was that, after the excitement of ordinations, these readings would deliver a stark dose of realism about ministry.

Ezekiel, sent to preach to a "nation of rebels," is warned that there is a good chance that they will refuse to hear, but even if they do, they will know, says God, "that there has been a prophet among them."

The first time I preached in my home village was at my father's funeral, so the response from a congregation of family, friends and neighbours was much more sympathetic than that which Jesus received when he returned to his home town and preached in the synagogue. He's just the carpenter, Mary's son, so where has his wisdom and power come from? "And they took offence at him." So negative is the response that he is unable to do many works of power there.

It's important to remember that fruitful preaching involves not only the efforts of the preacher, there's God, whose word the preacher must hear to preach, and whose grace, as Paul says is sufficient, even in times of difficulty. Then there is the attitude of the hearers. Is it encouraging and prayerful, expectant of hearing something a word from God or dismissive of any such possibility? I am glad to say that this has not been my experience in the Cathedral, but is a known issue in many places. I have had conversations with two priests who have shared their experience of congregations which seem to have little desire to be taught or interest in growing in the faith. We need to pray for our preachers as well as for our politicians, while we should expect much from them, we have a part to play too.
