

## WELCOME TO LINCOLN CATHEDRAL

We are delighted to welcome you to Lincoln Cathedral for the installation of Simon Jones as the 85<sup>th</sup> Dean of Lincoln. Founded in 1072, this cathedral has always been the seat (*cathedra*) of the Bishop of Lincoln and a centre of worship and mission for the Diocese of Lincoln.

The ministry of the Dean is rooted in the cathedral's primary purpose, which is the daily offering of worship. This afternoon's ceremonies take place around the service of Evening Prayer.

Earlier this afternoon, after Simon as Dean-Designate made the Declaration of Assent and Oaths of Allegiance, the Letters Patent from His Majesty to King were read and the Bishop of Lincoln collated Simon as a canon of the cathedral and instituted him as Dean of Lincoln. By means of this ceremony, the Dean-Designate became Dean of Lincoln and so he takes his place at the end of the Chapter procession this afternoon.

During this service, Simon will be installed as Dean in St Hugh's Choir, inducted into the temporalities of his office by the Subdean, and takes first place and is given a voice in the College of Canons. This completes the ceremonies by which Simon takes up office today.



The appointment by His Majesty The King of Dr Simon Jones as Dean of Lincoln is a most significant and uplifting occasion for us all who look upon Lincoln Cathedral with pride and dignity as our place in the County of Lincolnshire for worship, prayer and sanctuary. As we have already witnessed when Interim Dean, Simon has been "made for the job" with his desire to deliver an energising restart to the needs of the community within and without this building.

Both Simon and Darren, I know will be given genuine and willing support as they commence a new life, in a new place with new challenges. On behalf of the county I wish them well.

# The Very Reverend Dr Simon Jones

Simon was born and educated in St Albans, Hertfordshire, before going to university in Durham, where he read Theology and was organ scholar at the College of St Hild & St Bede. After staying on to read for a Master's degree, Simon spent a year working as a pastoral assistant in a parish in North London and teaching music in a primary school. He then moved to Cambridge where he trained for ordination at Westcott House and, as a member of Selwyn College, completed a doctorate in Syrian baptismal theology.

Simon was ordained deacon in 1999 and priest in 2000, and served his title as curate of Tewkesbury Abbey in the Diocese of Gloucester. In 2002 he became Chaplain and Fellow of Merton College, Oxford. As well as having responsibility for the day-to-day life of the Chapel, Simon was involved in other aspects of the College's life, including establishing and leading its welfare team.

Simon chairs the steering committee of the International Anglican Liturgical Consultation, and is a consultant to the Church of England Liturgical Commission. He has served as a trustee of the charitable company, *Hymns Ancient & Modern Ltd*, and will join its board again as chair in January 2025.

Simon was installed as an Honorary Canon of Christ Church, Oxford in 2015, and as a Wiccamical Prebendary (Honorary Canon Theologian) of Chichester Cathedral in 2016. He served as Interim Dean of Lincoln from March to December 2023.

Simon has moved to Lincoln with his partner, Canon Darren McFarland, who served as Vicar of St Andrew's, Headington, Oxford, from 2011 until this year, and will become Interim Priest of St Mary and St Nicolas, Spalding on 1 October.

# Today's service

The music at today's service is sung by the Choirs of Lincoln Cathedral and Merton College, Oxford, directed by Aric Prentice and Benjamin Nicholas. The organ is played by Jeffrey Makinson.

This service and the other sung services at the cathedral are available online. We welcome all those both near and far joining our worship as it is live streamed on the cathedral's Facebook page and YouTube channel.

We kindly request that you do not take photographs or make sound recordings during the service, or during the rehearsals beforehand.

# **Processions**

At 2 45pm, the congregation remains seated whilst the following processions make their way into the cathedral:

the Merton College Procession; and the procession of visiting clergy and of Readers and clergy of the Diocese of Lincoln.

At 2 50pm, the congregation stands as the Chair of the County Council, the Right Worshipful the Mayor of Lincoln and the Civic party, and the High Sheriff of Lincolnshire and His Majesty's Deputy Lieutenant of Lincolnshire are escorted to their places.

After the dignitaries have taken their seats all sit.

At 3pm, the congregation stands for the Foundation procession, which gathers at the rear of the nave ready for the service to start. Please turn to face the rear of the nave for the first part of the service.

# The Greeting

All turn to face west. The Cathedral Choir sings the introit, Sing joyfully unto God by Wiliam Byrd (Organist and Master of the Choristers of Lincoln Cathedral, 1563-1572)

Sing joyfully unto God our strength, sing loud unto the God of Jacob.

Take the song and bring forth the timbrel, the pleasant harp and the viol. Blow the trumpet in the new moon, even in the time appointed, and at our feast day. For this is a statute for Israel, and a law of the God of Jacob.

The Rev'd Canon Rowena King, Canon in Residence, addresses the congregation.

The Bishop welcomes the congregation and introduces the service.

My brothers and sisters, in the name of Christ, crucified and risen, I welcome you to this Cathedral Church. We gather here today to inaugurate the ministry of Simon Jones, the eighty-fifth Dean of Lincoln, to witness his installation, and to support him with our prayers.

In particular, we welcome Simon's family and friends, and those who have come to commend him to us from Merton College and the Diocese of Oxford.

The Warden of Merton College, Oxford and the Bishop of Oxford commend the Dean from his previous ministry.

Professor Jennifer Payne, Warden of Merton College, Oxford, says

Bishop Stephen, on behalf of the whole community of Merton College, I commend Simon to you. His time among us has enriched our common life. May his ministry here bring God's blessing to this place, and to all whom he seeks to serve.

The Rt Revd Dr Steven Croft, Bishop of Oxford, says

We ask you now to welcome him, and to pray for him as he is installed and inducted into the rights and responsibilities of his new office.

Bishop I am ready so to do, but first let His Majesty's Letters Patent

be read.

His Majesty's Letters Patent are read by Mrs Henrietta Reeve, Deputy Lieutenant of Lincolnshire, representing the Lord Lieutenant.

Bishop Simon, I greet you in the name of the Lord, and invite you to

pray with us as we seek God's blessing upon your new ministry

as Dean.

The Dean kneels to pray silently with the congregation. He then intones the Veni Creator, during which the Bishop anoints him with the Oil of Chrism.

Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire,

and lighten with celestial fire; thou the anointing Spirit art, who dost thy sevenfold gifts impart.

Thy blessed unction from above is comfort, life, and fire of love; enable with perpetual light the dullness of our blinded sight:

Anoint and cheer our soiled face with the abundance of thy grace: keep far our foes, give peace at home; where thou art guide no ill can come.

Teach us to know the Father, Son, and thee, of Both, to be but One; that through the ages all along this may be our endless song,

Praise to thy eternal merit, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

# The Installation

Dean

Mr Subdean and Members of the Chapter, I present these Letters Patent of His Majesty the King and these Letters Mandatory of Stephen our Bishop and ask you to install and induct me into a prebend and into the deanery of this Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lincoln.

The Rev'd Canon Nick Brown, Precentor and Subdean, passes the Letters to the Chapter Officer who reads the Letters Mandatory to the Chapter, the Letters Patent having been read earlier in the service.

The Subdean responds on behalf of Chapter

We gladly accept these Letters from His Majesty the King and from Stephen our Bishop and receive you, (here the Subdean takes the Dean by the right hand) Simon Matthew Jones, as a brother and admit you as a Canon of this church and Prebendary of South Scarle, and do admit and invest you Dean of this Cathedral, together with all the rights, members and appurtenances thereunto belonging.

He puts the New Testament into the Dean's hands, continuing

In the name of Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Subdean and other Residentiary Canons conduct the Dean to his prebendal stall of South Scarle, where the Subdean installs him.

Subdean We install you, brother, into the stall assigned to your prebend.

The Dean stands and turns to look at the back of the stall and the Subdean continues

Look upon the titles of the psalms, which you are to recite

every day, if nothing hinders.

He then says

Simon, you have been called to serve God amongst us here, and to lead this Foundation and community. I now invite you to accompany me to the stall assigned to the office and dignity of the Dean of this Cathedral Church.

The Foundation says with one voice

May God give you grace to lead us as Dean!

The Dean is vested in his cope by the Rev'd Canon David Dadswell, Residentiary Canon, and moves to the Dean's stall, where the Subdean installs him, seating him in his stall and saying

We install you, brother, into the stall assigned to the Dean. The Lord keep watch over your going out and your coming in, from this time forth and for evermore.

All Amen.

The Dean kneels and says the Lord's Prayer with the Foundation and the whole congregation. Meanwhile Great Tom is sounded to announce that the Dean of Lincoln has been installed.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. thy kingdom come. thy will be done. on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil; for thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Precentor O Lord, save your servant who puts his trust in you.

Precentor Let the enemy gain no advantage over him nor the wicked approach to hurt him.

Precentor Be to him, O Lord, a strong tower

All from the face of the enemy.

Precentor O Lord, hear our prayer

All and let our cry come to you.

Subdean

O God our beginning and our ending, we praise you that you give us grace and strength to serve you, and that you have called your servant Simon into the fellowship of this Cathedral Foundation.

Grant him such love for you and for your people that he may take up his cross each day and follow in the steps of your Son.

May he be so encouraged by his fellowship and unity with us that he may be a strength to others; may his prayers combine with ours to come into your presence, and may your Holy Spirit lead him day by day until he comes to your everlasting kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The proceedings in the Chapter House (page 24) are screened for members of the congregation, during which the Choir of Merton College sings Locus iste by Gabriel Jackson (composed in celebration of Simon's twenty-two years as Chaplain of Merton), and O clap your hands by Orlando Gibbons.

Please stand as the Foundation procession returns to the Cathedral Church, the following hymn is sung and a collection is taken:

The Dean receives the hand of the Subdean, the other residentiary canons and of each other canon in turn. Meanwhile the Choir sings Ubi Caritas by Maurice Duruflé

Ubi caritas et amor, Deus ibi est. Congregavit nos in unum Christi amor. Exultemus, et in ipso iucundemur. Timeamus, et amemus Deum vivum. Et ex corde diligamus nos sincero. Amen.

Where charity and love are, God is there. Christ's love has gathered us into one. Let us rejoice and be pleased in him. Let us fear, and let us love the living God. And may we love each other with a sincere heart. Amen.

The Subdean seats the Dean in the College, saying

We receive you, brother, to first place and a voice in the College of Canons.

The Subdean kneels before the Dean and, placing his hands between those of the Dean, says with the entire Foundation

Simon, I promise obedience to you as Dean.

The Subdean returns to his seat and the College remains standing.

Dean Let us pray.

Go before us, O Lord, in all our doings with your most gracious favour, and further us with your continual help, that in all our works, begun, continued and ended in you, we may glorify your holy name, and finally by your mercy attain everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

College Amen.

Dean Let us bless the Lord.

# **Lincoln Cathedral: History & Governance**

Lincoln Cathedral has fifty-three canonries. In medieval times each was paid a *prebend*, or salary, consisting usually of the income from a manor or holding of land. Each canon is still known by the name of their prebend, which is written on a tablet above the stall in St Hugh's Choir, together with the Latin title of the psalm which should be recited daily 'if nothing hinders'. This means that between them the entire psalter is recited daily. The Bishop says Psalm 1; the Dean, as Prebend of South Scarle, Psalms 96-99.

The vast medieval Diocese of Lincoln stretched from the Humber to the Thames, including what are now the Dioceses of Leicester, Peterborough, Oxford and St Albans. South Scarle formed part of the Bishop of Lincoln's jurisdiction in Nottinghamshire, centred on his manor and castle at Newark. The church was allocated as the endowment of a prebend in the Cathedral before 1147, when its possessions were confirmed by Bishop Alexander in a remarkable charter witnessed by twenty-seven canons, other ecclesiastics (including Aelred, the future Abbot of Rievaulx, canonised as St Aelred of Hexham) and a group of local people. Those who have held this stall include William de Montfort (Dean of St Paul's 1285-1294) and Edmund Cartwright (d.1823), inventor of the power loom.

Lincoln Cathedral currently has four residentiary canons: the Dean, Precentor, Missioner, and a non-stipendiary canon whose principal ministry is as Diocesan Secretary. As the longest serving of the residentiaries, the Precentor is also the Subdean, and acts in that capacity in today's service. Together with four lay canons and a diocesan priest, they form the Chapter, which is the cathedral's governing body. It is the responsibility of the Dean as chair of the Chapter to govern and direct, on its behalf, the life and work of the cathedral.

The forty-nine non-residentiary canons include the suffragan bishops and archdeacons of the Diocese, clergy and lay people who have been recognised for their service to the Diocese or wider church and society, and ecumenical canons from different denominations.

The College of Canons exists to give counsel to the Bishop and to the Chapter on matters concerning the cathedral as the seat of the Bishop. It receives and considers the annual report and audited accounts of the cathedral and discusses such matters concerning the cathedral as may be raised by its members. In the event of an episcopal vacancy, the College of Canons is responsible for electing the new Bishop of Lincoln.

The cathedral's governing documents are its constitution and statutes. It is regulated by the Church Commissioners and the Charity Commission under the Cathedrals Measure (2021).
