BIBLE READINGS

Recently I visited Woolsthorpe Manor, Isaac Newton's home. It's a powerful place to visit with wonderful displays about the astonishing discoveries Newton made in the fields of light, optics, motion, cosmology, gravity and so on. It reminded me of the time when, in a letter to fellow scientist Robert Hooke, Newton made his most famous statement: "If I have seen further, it is by standing on the shoulders of Giants". Although what he conceived was qualitatively and disruptively different, he acknowledged that he was building on so many people's work.

As we move into All Saints season, closely followed by All Souls, we become mightily aware that 'we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses' (Hebrews 12:1). These can be great saints and holy thinkers who have forged heroic pathways of mission or developed the Church's thinking about God in dazzlingly insightful ways. They are also the unknown, quiet heroes who played a key role in our lives at various points along our spiritual journey.

Taking Newton's shoulders of giants concept, and living in Lincolnshire, a land of saints, we can feel constrained to preserve what has been handed on to us. However, what Newton did was to apply his own genius to what he had received and move it on. That was the faithful thing to do. My favourite Lincolnshire saint is Sarah Swift, the Mighty Atom. A nurse, she ended up as Matron in Chief in the First World War, responsible for nursing in 1,786 auxiliary nursing hospitals. A woman of serious faith, she could not, in faith, tolerate the low esteem and poor organisation which surrounded nurses and so founded the Royal College of Nursing to make sure nurses were treated with respect and had a voice.

It's all about taking the tradition and applying it scripturally, with faith, reflecting on our context and applying our brains to work out the Gospel approach to the situations we encounter. There are significant issues we need to reflect on now. Moving into the season of Remembrance, what have we learnt from past wars and sacrifices that informs our approach to the many horrific wars today? How do we weave the faith of the centuries into our advancing scientific and social understanding to build our approaches to assisted dying, equal marriage, or reparations for slavery? The cloud of witnesses is there to support, encourage and hold us to account for the quality of our faithful response.
