Parish Giving Scheme - a new way to support Lincoln Cathedral

Following the decision to dissolve the Lincoln Cathedral Community Association, those who were previously giving to the cathedral via the LCCA are encouraged to support the cathedral via the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS). Forms are available in the cathedral from the Vergers Vestry, alternatively, you can set up giving online at www.parishgiving.org.uk/donors/find-your-parish/lincoln-cathedral-lincoln/. If you currently have a standing order in favour of LCCA, please cancel it, and make your contribution either direct to the cathedral, or through the PGS. The LCCA account will be closed in due course. A proportion of the money received through the PGS will be given to other charities (as was the case with giving via the LCCA). If you currently use the blue envelopes, please continue to use these until they run out. The cathedral will be able to supply you with bundles of our standard gift aid envelopes if this is your preferred method of giving. If you don't currently make a financial contribution towards the cathedral's mission and ministry, please consider doing so via the PGS. WELCOME TO LINCOLN CATHEDRAL

This service, and the other sung services during the week, are available online and we welcome all those joining our worship as it is live streamed on the cathedral's Facebook page and YouTube channel.

We kindly request that you do not take photographs or make sound recordings during the service, or during the rehearsals beforehand.

THE NICENE CREED

All

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.





Those who wish to receive communion in both kinds are reminded that intinction (dipping an individual host into the wine) is not permitted to prevent the spread of infection, or contamination for those who are gluten intolerant. Also, please assist those administering the chalice by gently guiding the chalice to your lips and tilting it sufficiently.
