Welcome to Lincoln Cathedral

This service begins outside the Crown Court building within the castle, where the congregation is invited to gather ready to begin at 10.30am. If you are able, please bring branches with you to represent the palms that were strewn before Christ on his entry into Jerusalem. From the castle we will process to the front of the cathedral where the Gospel of the Passion will be read, before continuing into the cathedral for the Eucharist of Palm Sunday.

In the case of wet weather, we will begin inside the west end of the cathedral and process into seats in the nave of the cathedral during the first processional hymn. In this situation, the second procession (after the reading of the Passion) will not take place.

You are warmly invited to join us for tea and coffee in the Chapter House after the service.

Any young people are more than welcome to join the Sunday School that meets during the Sung Eucharist. If you would like more information, please ask one of the Cathedral Stewards.

We kindly request that you do not take photographs or make sound recordings during the service, or during the rehearsals beforehand.

Any indications for sitting, kneeling or standing are given for guidance. If you need to sit at any point during the service, please feel free to do so. All baptised Christians who usually receive communion are invited to do so. Please follow the directions of the stewards. If you would prefer to receive a blessing, please carry this service booklet as a signal to the priest.

A collection will be taken during this service.





PASSION READING LUKE 23.1-49

Please join in fully in the parts in **bold** type and stand when indicated.

Evangelist	The Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.
Evangelist	Then the assembly rose as a body and brought Jesus before Pilate. They began to accuse him, saying,
Priests	'We found this man perverting our nation, forbidding us to pay taxes to the emperor, and saying that he himself is the Messiah, a king.'
Evangelist	Then Pilate asked him,
Pilate	'Are you the king of the Jews?'
Evangelist	He answered,
Jesus	'You say so.'

- Evangelist Then Pilate said to the chief priests and the crowds,
- *Pilate* 'I find no basis for an accusation against this man.'

Evangelist But they were insistent and said,

- *Priests* 'He stirs up the people by teaching throughout all Judea, from Galilee where he began even to this place.'
- Evangelist When Pilate heard this, he asked whether the man was a Galilean. And when he learned that he was under Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him off to Herod, who was himself in Jerusalem at that time. When Herod saw Jesus, he was very glad, for he had been wanting to see him for a long time, because he had heard about him and was hoping to see him perform some sign. He questioned him at some length, but Jesus gave him no answer. The chief priests and the scribes stood by, vehemently accusing him. Even Herod with his soldiers treated him with contempt and mocked him; then he put an elegant robe on him, and sent him back to Pilate. That same day Herod and Pilate became friends with each other; before this they had been enemies.

Pilate then called together the chief priests, the leaders, and the people, and said to them,

Pilate 'You brought me this man as one who was perverting the people; and here I have examined him in your presence and have not found this man guilty of any of your charges against him. Neither has Herod, for he sent him back to us. Indeed, he has done nothing to deserve death. I will therefore have him flogged and release him.'

Evangelist Then they all shouted out together,

Crowd 'Away with this fellow! Release Barabbas for us!'

Evangelist (This was a man who had been put in prison for an insurrection that had taken place in the city, and for murder.) Pilate, wanting to release Jesus, addressed them again; but they kept shouting,

Crowd 'Crucify, crucify him!'

Evangelist A third time he said to them,

- *Pilate* 'Why, what evil has he done? I have found in him no ground for the sentence of death; I will therefore have him flogged and then release him.'
- *Evangelist* But they kept urgently demanding with loud shouts that he should be crucified; and their voices prevailed. So Pilate gave his verdict that their demand should be granted. He released the man they asked for, the one who had been put in prison for insurrection and murder, and he handed Jesus over as they wished.

As they led him away, they seized a man, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming from the country, and they laid the cross on him, and made him carry it behind Jesus. A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for him. But Jesus turned to them and said,


- Jesus 'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For the days are surely coming when they will say, "Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed." Then they will begin to say to the mountains, "Fall on us"; and to the hills, "Cover us." For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?'
- *Evangelist* Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him. When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said,
- Jesus 'Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing.'
- *Evangelist* And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying,
- *Priests* 'He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!'
- *Evangelist* The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying,
- Soldiers 'If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!'

There was also an inscription over him, 'This is the King of the Evangelist Jews.' One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, 'Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!' Criminal 1 But the other rebuked him, saying, Evangelist 'Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence Criminal 2 of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong.' Then he said, Evangelist Criminal 2 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.' He replied, Evangelist 'Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise.' Jesus It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole Evangelist land until three in the afternoon, while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, 'Father, into your hands I commend my spirit.' Jesus Having said this, he breathed his last. When the centurion saw Evangelist what had taken place, he praised God and said, Centurion 'Certainly this man was innocent.' And when all the crowds who had gathered there for this Evangelist spectacle saw what had taken place, they returned home, beating their breasts. But all his acquaintances, including the women who had followed him from Galilee, stood at a distance, watching these things. At the end of the Passion the Evangelist says This is the Passion of the Lord.




