Play the Organ Year 2025

A message from Jeffrey Makinson, Organist and Assistant Director of Music:

'Organisations from across the organ and church music world are working together to promote Play the Organ Year 2025, a year-long project to increase the number of people playing the organ and appreciating its music.

The Royal College of Organists is taking a lead on this, promoting the instrument through a varied range of concerts and tutorial courses throughout the year.

Here in Lincoln, I am pleased to report that there are currently four promising young students who are receiving organ tuition. Each of them is either choristers or former choristers in the cathedral choir: Feola Akinfenwa, Ben Brown, Elsa Peel-Cobas, and Isaac Turner. To enrich their learning experience, we are inviting each student to play a short organ voluntary after Evensong one day. Ben performed J.S. Bach's Prelude and Fugue in G minor, from the 'Short Eight' Preludes and Fugues. The other students will perform early on in Michaelmas Term. I will keep you informed when this happens. Any words of support and encouragement which you might be able to give to these young pupils would be hugely appreciated.'
